
Prayer Chain Ministry

News and Views from the Global missions Committee IT'S HERE!!



Did you hear the DRUM BEATS ROLL on **SEPTEMBER 25**?! Did you see a WISHING WELL or a WATER BUCK-ET??? Did you put a special envelope in them? If your answer is YES to any of these questions – then you know what has arrived! The **ELCA WORLD HUNGER CAMPAIGN!**

This is a four-week effort for St. Peter's to raise awareness and funds towards a significant ministry of our greater Church. Our goal is to tell you the stories of folks who live in parts of our world that have far fewer material resources than we do and to invite you to make a difference to them – to be generous. Our financial goal is to raise \$5000 by October 16.

Come watch our pastors try to lift a few 40-POUND WATER JUGS while making announcements at worship on **OCTOBER 2**. Be sure to witness a **SUPER "SKITTISH" SERMON** featuring some of our favorite St. Peter's Players along with Pr. Sarah on **OCTOBER 9**. Welcome Hannah Wolfe Young Adults in Global Mission Program October 16th World Hunger Day

I have always loved traveling and being able to listen to stories of people very different from myself. Growing up in Reading, I was lucky enough to have a family that took me with them on all kinds of adventures and also to be part of a church community where I began to learn about God and being part of a community of faith. When I learned of an opportunity to go to Tanzania at 18 with a youth delegation from the Northeast Pennsylvania Synod, I jumped at the chance to go. I didn't know how this would change my life, but it set into motion something I couldn't have anticipated and opened my eyes to the incredible diversity of God's creation. When I attended college in New York City, I majored in International Studies to get a chance to learn as much about the world as I could. Here, I would learn of the many systems that oppress people around the world and also the amazing ideas

people have to address some of these issues. I learned of another opportunity during my sophomore year that would take me to El Salvador with a group of justice-minded young women in 2010 where my eyes would be opened to unspeakable atrocities and incredible hope. When I returned, I spent a semester on a ship experiencing beautiful diversity of our world as well as learning about the ways in which we all connect. For me, all of these experiences connected; each one allowed me to listen to the stories of people in the world and to walk with them on a small piece of their journeys as they in turn walked with me and made a profound impact on my life.

In July of 2013, I set out on a journey I knew almost nothing about. I packed way too much clothing into too many bags, and I got on a flight to Chicago where orientation for the Young Adults in Global Mission program would be held. Everything I had experienced made me want to really delve deep into one place, and that place happened to be in a small rural community in South Africa. Here, I got to live, work and develop relationships with people who became my friends and teachers. I learned about hope, God, love, and what it means to accompany someone along their way.

During my year of service in South Africa as a Young Adult in Global Mission, I also learned a lot about myself, which has helped me to discern God's call for me in the world and to realize that the journey is sometimes difficult and unclear, but God walks with us through it all.

I look forward to speaking with you all on October 16th and being able to share a small part of my journey.

October: National Breast Cancer Awareness Month...but...
It is also Domestic Violence Awareness Month

We all know that October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. (Ladies and Men: both of you should be performing self-breast examinations, looking for lumps or abnormalities. Those mammograms are important – so consult with your physician to assure you're following his/her recommendations. Each person's situation is different, so ask your Provider!).

Your Health and Wellness Committee wanted to address one other topic that warrants attention:

Domestic violence

The week of 10/16 - 10/22/2016 is the National Week of Action.

On average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States. During one year, this equates to more than 10 million women and men. 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have been victims of [some form of] physical violence by an intimate partner within their **lifetime**.

Domestic violence thrives when we are silent; but if we take a stand and work together, we can end domestic violence. Throughout the month of October, help us raise attention. Wear purple. (Purple is the color of domestic violence and wearing it shows your support). Talk with a friend, family member, colleague, or neighbour, about domestic violence. Talking about domestic violence helps to erase stigma and shows survivors that they will be supported. Thanks for taking the time to call attention to this national problem.

Come hear John Gasangwa's incredible story and journey, as we welcome him on Sunday, October 30th at 9:15a.m. in the Youth Lounge

The Global Outreach Committee and the Tanzania Mission Committee will co-host a very special speaker from Rwanda, Africa. John is the founder of Arise Rwanda Ministries (www.ariserwanda.org), a non-profit group which supports impoverished children and families in the village of Boneza in western Rwanda.

John was born in a Ugandan refugee camp in 1981. As a child he witnessed all the horrors of famine, rape, murder and human cruelty one can imagine. At age 10 he prayed to God and made a promise that "he would live the rest of his life serving the poor people of the world" if he could receive an education.

At age 13 he traveled back to Rwanda to learn that his father had been killed in the fighting of the genocide. Against incredible odds, John was educated, graduated from college and worked in micro-finance for World Vision, Opportunities International and KIVA. In 2011 he completed his MBA in Global Social Sustainable Enterprise (MBA-GSSE) at Colorado State University. He returned to Rwanda to fulfill his commitment to God by founding Arise Rwanda Ministries (ARM). The mission of ARM is education, clean water and sustainable community development.

Since that time, ARM, along with a very supportive board here in the US, have drilled 8 water wells, started 5 preschools and developed micro enterprise solutions to the community of Boneza. And in February of 2016, John's dream of a vocational / academic secondary school in Boneza was realized with the opening of Kivu Hills Academy with a class of 22 students.

Come hear John's incredible story and journey. Join us as we welcome John Gasangwa on Sunday, October 30th at 9:15a.m. in the Youth Lounge.

Pastor's Letter

Texts in the Bible are even more evocative of multiple readings than others for at least two reasons. First, unlike most modern poems and stories, the Bible is a multi-voiced text – including books written over time by different authors with widely varying perspectives. Second, cross-cultural study of scripture has shown that the flexibility in the interpretation of scripture is a crucial part of what makes such texts function in an ongoing way as lifegiving resources for changing communities.

Dear Friends:

The quote copied above, was one I shared with my Wednesday Morning Bible Study class a couple of weeks ago, as we examined the variety of cultural, religious and human forces at work in the formation of what we know and love as the Bible. I found Dr. Carr's words fascinating, in his theory about why the Bible continues to be one of the most popular books to buy in the world, since it first became accessible to the masses half a millennium ago. The "flexibility in the interpretation of scripture" serving the role the Bible embodies as a "lifegiving resource for changing communities" is Carr's claim.

That is quite a statement, especially in a world like ours that probably embraces "change" more fully than any other culture before us, and at a much faster pace than ever before. The changing digital landscape is an almost daily experience for us. The chaotic nature of the international community causes us to digest war, terrorism, and genocide every week in different places around the globe. And the evolving relational and sexual culture, especially in the developing nations, makes one feel like the 1956 Frank Loesser song, "Standing on the corner watching all the girls go by" is almost archaic, and more characteristic of the colonial era than the post-WWII one.

But Dr. Carr is right. The gift and blessing of our holy scripture is its relevance and applicability to everything we face in our ever-changing world. Our God is a living God, who has chosen to remain connected to our world and be an active presence within it. Our scripture is the primary conduit through which that lifegiving presence is made known. So if you are struggling with the morning news and the newspaper headlines, make sure to be present in our worship services and our Sunday Schools classes, and in the gatherings organized by our social outreach leaders. Be part of our ongoing engagement of this lifegiving scripture in worship, learning, service, stewardship and fellowship. Join your God in the call to be people of faith in this crazy, changing world, that is also a beautiful, abundant and God-filled world. Come and find others who want to join you in being exactly the kind of disciples God needs in the world.


Pastor Sarah's Message

From the Director of Music

Why Do We Sing in Church?

Maybe you've never thought about it before. Maybe you already have a concrete idea. Maybe it is a question you've always kept to yourself. Why DO we sing in church?

Singing a text helps us remember it. Ask a child to recite their ABCs and you'll be greeted with a song. We sing because often the words of a hymn can carry us through trying times, help us celebrate when we're feeling joyful, or open our eyes to realities within our world.

The words we sing are poems set to music and the two are oftentimes so inextricably linked that trying to separate them is comical. For example, try singing the words for Amazing Grace to the tune for "Joy to the World" (Antioch). Here are the words in case you need them:

Amazing grace, how sweet the sound, That saved a wretch like me! I once was lost, but now am found, Was blind, but now I see. Was blind, but now I see. Was blind, was blind, but now I see.

Alternatively, those of a certain age will remember the TV show Gilligan's Island. You can sing the first 5 lines above to the tune of that show's theme song. Words set to music are obviously a powerful memory tool; one that we use to pass on the Christian story. So, we sing songs to remember important words for important times. Such a practical reason for singing shouldn't be scoffed at, but what about the liturgical/theological reasons? What happens when we sing?

By raising our voices collectively in song, we communally proclaim our faith. Each of our voices melds with the others around us, and together as the assembled people of God we proclaim the God's word of grace to each other and to the world. Such communal action is in direct contrast to a culture that idolizes the efforts of the individual. We proclaim this faith together because we must remind one another of the saving grace of God and because we ourselves must be reminded of this grace.

Also, you may have noticed that in our worship there is a consistent juxtaposition between spoken word and song. The next time you're in church, notice how we say and sing, say and sing. I like to think of it the same way we think about teaching. Not all are visual learners, not all are aural learners, not all are spatial learners. However, by combining symbol (communion, baptism), spoken word (readings, sermon), music (hymns, liturgical music) and liturgical action (coming up for communion, passing the peace) we create a space where all may encounter the message of Jesus saving death on the cross.

Finally, when we sing together, we become the body of Christ. This is of vital importance to who we are as a community. We do not point to ourselves; it is Christ whom we adore. It is Christ who forms us into a community of faith, and it is Christ who speaks the words of grace around us. As we sing, the good news we hear coming from the mouths of the people around us becomes the word from God, via the Spirit, through the body of Christ! Thus, during worship we who have gathered are the primary musical instrument, having become the mouth, lips, tongue, vocal chords, resonating passages, and lungs of the God of the covenant who has promised to save us.

May our singing be enlivened by the God who calls us, Christ who redeems us, and the Spirit who sustains us.
