



# **Eating Disorder Awareness**

While February is usually 'heart month' – the Health and Wellness Committee felt it was important to emphasize other known, but not as prominent diseases where help is needed.

The goal of National Eating Disorders Awareness is to put the spotlight on the seriousness of eating disorders and to improve public understanding of their causes, triggers and treatments. By increasing awareness and access to resources, we can encourage early detection and intervention, which can improve the likelihood of full recovery for millions.

If someone is exhibiting signs or thoughts of struggling with an eating disorder, intervening during the early stages of development can significantly increase the likelihood of preventing the onset of a full-blown eating disorder. It also leads to greater chances of a full recovery. It can prevent years of struggle and can even save lives. A key goal is to direct individuals to a free online screening for eating disorders at screening.mentalhealthscreening.org/NEDA.

This year, we are asking everyone to complete the online eating disorders screening and to encourage their loved ones, friends, colleagues, and more to take part as well. In addition to sharing the screening, you can learn more about these illnesses and how important it is to keep the conversation about eating disorders relevant and ongoing. Sharing facts and stats online, hosting an event, or participating in our social media events are great ways to be a part of this year's initiative.



BUSOKA ORPHANS and ST. PETER'S HOUSE: The St. Peter's staff and the TMC just received word that there are at present 52 orphans in Busoka, ages 7 – 17, who benefit from the money we send throughout the year for higher education. As reported in the January Herald, the Cookie Walk yielded \$5,750 through your efforts in baking your delicious Christmas cookies, buying the cookies and/or donations given. That entire amount, to be received in Busoka this month, is earmarked for education of these orphans. As a reminder, this house is named for us here at St. Peter's and is used as the pastor's home, community building, place of gathering, and a hostel for visitors when they arrive in Busoka for an extended period of time. # **Spiritual Gifts**

"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit"

# DISCERNMENT

Discernment is the gift that motivates a believer to seek God's will and purpose and apply that understanding to individual and congregation situations.

#### Scripture References (NRSV):

John 16:13-15— "When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you."

**Romans 9:1** - "I am speaking the truth in Christ – I am not lying; my conscience confirms it by the Holy Spirit --"

1 Corinthians 2:9-16 – "But, as it is written, 'What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him' – these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God. And we speak of these things in words not taught by human wisdom but taught by the Spirit, interpreting spiritual things to those who are spiritual."

#### If you have this gift,

You want to know God's will so intensely that the time it takes to acquire this understanding is insignificant.

You are able to see if an action is motivated by an evil force or is in accord with the understanding of Scripture.

You are able to express this understanding and how it can be applied.

#### **Connections to Ministry:**

A person with the gift of Discernment can serve the congregation in teaching (particularly adults), decision making, and can help the congregation stay on track. Specific areas are public relations, counseling, social ministry, church council, prayer chain ministry, and long-range planning.

# **Lutheran Marriage Encounter Weekends**





# Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends:

It is "love month" in America. As you are reading this, you are just two weeks away from our cultural observance of Valentine's Day. Everyone from children in preschool to nonagenarians at our local nursing homes will be making sure they bow to the midmonth altar of candy and roses and dinners and cards ... and who knows what else this year, as the consumer engine of entertainment is already cranking up its advertising machines. I will joyously worship at the altar with my wife, as we get some things for our grandson, Sam. I don't want to be "that grandfather" who was the only one who didn't send a valentine to his grandson at preschool. But to be honest, the whole orgy of consumerism surrounding February 14<sup>th</sup> feels a little desperate to me. Like the chicken with its head cut off in the barnyard, Valentine's Day has a frantic flailing about it that feels rather tragic.

The problem is not "love" of course. It is the way we interpret the word "love." We load it up with sentimentalism, unrealistic expectations, and syrupy fantasies about the miracles love can accomplish. It is the Hallmark Channel on high speed. As a Christian counter to that, consider these words of C.S. Lewis in his classic work, <u>The Four Loves</u>. I have read this passage at any number of weddings over the years:



But, of course, ceasing to be "in love" need not mean ceasing to love. Love in this second sense – love as distinct from being "in love" – is not merely a feeling. It is a deep unity, maintained by the will and deliberately strengthened by habit; reinforced by in Christian marriages the grace which both partners ask, and receive, from God. They can have this love for each other even at those moments when they do not like each other; as you love yourself even when you do not like yourself.

God's love is grace embodied in relationship ... first between God and God's children, and then among the children themselves. It reaches its fullest and richest form in covenantal relationships, whether they be covenantal ones, familial ones, or those deep friendships which we pray to experience with one or two companions in life. So as the world focuses on its temporal interpretation of love this month with its typically over the top expectations and rituals, may you feel the touch of the love of God that can truly deliver on the promises it makes to you.

# Pastor Sarah's Message

Dear friends in Christ,

Do you keep a calendar?

I must admit that I didn't regularly keep a calendar till I was in the middle of seminary. I think before then I could usually keep track of appointments, due dates, and family occasions in my head. Then one day in the middle of February 2008 I realized that I just had to write things down. There were too many assignments, too many appointments, and I couldn't keep them straight any more.

Fast forward nine years and I feel like my life is filled with calendars!

Case in point, the other day the program staff and rostered staff were sitting down synchronizing the main church calendar with our many personal calendars for the month of February. As we were going through the different weeks, it dawned on me that this month is filled with many retreats. At the end of January a weekend was dedicated to a women's retreat at Camp Kirchenwald. So what about you? How do you take moments of retreat?

I ask this because, like me, you may have a calendar full of stuff. Okay, if you're like me you may have a few different calendars full of stuff. And it may be very important stuff... doctor's appointments, meetings, planned outings with the kids, etc. All of it is important.

Yet...there is something to taking some time for retreat.

Even Jesus did it. (And his calendar was filled with important stuff!) His earthly ministry was filled with wrangling a team of new volunteers and learners, going toe to toe with standard operating procedures of the day, and creating new policies that were in line with God's kingdom. Let's not forget all the time on his calendar for miracles!

"Because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, [Jesus] said to [his disciples], 'Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.' So they went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place." (Mark 6:31-32)

# **Letter From the Vicar**



As I was looking out the window of my office this afternoon contemplating the direction I wanted to go with a sermon, I suddenly found myself mesmerized by a rather large murder of crows gathered on the lawn across the parking lot. I had seen several crows this morning pecking at the parking lot and Pastor Craig questioned just what it was they were eating; we had freezing rain the night before and neither of us could imagine just what they were finding. However, now they were back but instead gathered on the lawn pecking and perhaps even frolicking in ways that only a bird would look natural doing.

Even though we were unable to determine just what they were eating from our vantage point, the fact of the matter was that they were obviously finding something. There was food being provided for them. Matthew 6:25-26 immediately came to mind: "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what

you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?" I read these words and yet have to recognize that there are many in the world today for whom these worries are very valid and life threatening. According to the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, approximately 795 million people worldwide suffer from chronic undernourishment; 795 million... That is a mind-boggling statistic to me. Thousands die each year from starvation. Where is the disconnect between these words in Matthew that are meant to bring comfort and the reality of our world?

I found myself then thinking about my daughter. She just turned one year of age, and she is still completely helpless. We are in the process of teaching her how to feed herself, but she is completely reliant on us to provide her with the food for her to eat; such is the nature of all children. God provides nourishment to children but uses other people to do so. So God uses other people to feed those for whom the ability to feed themselves is inhibited in some way.

This amazing planet we live upon is capable of providing enough food for everyone of its inhabitants. The problem is that not every inhabitant of this world has access to the food they need to survive. Why doesn't God provide for these people? Why do people go hungry and/or starve? I know we live in a world still wrought with sin and death; a situation that we all live with every day. It is hard to imagine human sin being that powerful, but if you look at the evidence, the sinful choices we make can have dire consequences for those around us as well.

Later in Matthew 25:35, "...for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." These are the actions we are called to take in loving response to what Christ has first done for us. As I said earlier, God uses US to care for and feed those whom cannot care for and feed themselves. When it comes to loving your neighbor, these seemingly small things we can do have an incredibly large impact on the world around us

This is February and with Valentines Day right in the middle of this month, love is a concept that is always around as we see hearts and cupids everywhere. However, if you Google search the definition of love it says, "an intense feeling of deep affection." Love goes far beyond just the romantic aspects of love that Valentine's Day celebrates. Love is a deep affection for another. I would ask all of us to look at how we can show love, show an intense feeling of deep affection for our neighbor; especially those who need it most. Find ways to give of yourself. You can help out at a food kitchen, food pantries, donate food, clothing, etc... There are so many ways that you can get involved and help those in need and I think that you will be hard pressed to find a more fulfilling sense of the true nature of love for another than in those very acts of kindness.

# From the Director of Music

#### **Vocation Calling**

At Valparaiso University, where I earned my undergraduate degree, we talked a lot about vocation. The motto of the university, "In Thy Light, We See Light", was taken from Psalm 36:9 and shaped much of this discussion. We talked about what it meant to be called to a particular line of work and how we could lead lives of service toward our neighbors. As with many things one encounters in such a formative time, these conversations have followed me

for much of my life and I'm certain they will continue to plague me...er...serve to enlighten my experiences.

Fittingly, last year at the Institute for Liturgical Studies, a conference held at Valparaiso University every spring, I attended a workshop entitled "Reflecting on Vocation in your Congregation" led by Mark Schwehn and Dorothy Bass. They offered the following working definition of vocation:

Vocation is the shape that faith, active in love, takes in the world.

I found this to be so freeing. Vocation isn't that one thing we are meant to do; we have multi-career lives. It isn't only a set of social roles; we are more than fathers, mothers, children, etc. It isn't a way of establishing one's worth; there is no hierarchy of calls. It is not only "church work"; there are calls to work outside of the church. Vocation isn't an individual matter only; what we do affects the people around us.

Much of this resonated with me as I was completing my graduate studies. I often found myself asking, but what's the point of learning how to play if it isn't helping anyone? I wanted to be able to use the skills and artistry I had developed in service to a calling. I was looking for a way to use the skills I had been given, the skills I had continued to develop, in service to my neighbors.

Of course, I have many ways to do just that. I lead worship and teach. I offer my expertise on committees and engage in discussions with my friends and colleagues. And, as I do all of these things I try to remain keenly aware that I am called to use my knowledge and skills with a service-oriented mindset.

How do you serve your neighbors? What special things can you do, that no one else can, to help make the world around you a better place? What shape does your faith, active in love, take in the world?
