## September 11:

Discussion leader: Neil Snyder

Guided by a wonderful series of lessons produced by Select Learning entitled "Reformation Roots", CrossPoints will begin to look at the Reformation Era that begins with the church suffering from moral decay and fierce defensiveness and ends with a fracturing of the church into many smaller pieces. The series' major themes of authority and freedom are woven throughout, and even the casual listener will see many social, economic, political and religious parallels to today's world that will offer boundless opportunities for discussion and comment.

At first, we will survey how the church came to be so diverse and divided and how historical events paved the way for those courageous voices, even before Luther, to address issues of faith, reason, and authority - emboldened and aided by the rise and spread of humanism and intellectual and spiritual inquiry. We will follow this series of twelve presentations periodically throughout our program year, ending in May of next year, as one way in which St. Peters can join in the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration of the Reformation.

## September 18:

Discussion leader: The Rev. Richard Geib

Next year the Christian world celebrates the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther and what came to be known as the Protestant Reformation. It was in October of 1517 that he nailed his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany and thus started a movement that one great historian said "set all of Europe ablaze!" Why do we celebrate an event that did "change the world" but is now 500 years old? Is the Reformation still relevant to our faith today? What were and remain some of Lutheranisms strengths and weaknesses now that 500 years have passed? Or should we be more concerned about the ecumenical movement and planning for one united Christian Church! Why remain Lutheran? Join us for a good discussion.

## September 25: "The End of Christiandom"

Discussion leader: The Rev Dr John Emmert, Retired Episcopal priest and friend of St. Peter's, adjunct consultant in the Clergy and Congregation Care program of the Samaritan Center.

Recently, some of you may have seen articles or interviews referring to Robert P Jones' new book *The End of White Christian America*. Jones is founder of the **Public Religion Research Institute**, which seeks to gather data and interpret contemporary trends in American religious thought and behavior. The book is his latest offering on the subject. Others of you may know of theologian Douglas John Hall's book, *The End of Christiandom and the Future of Christianity*, or writings by Phyllis Tickle and Dianna Butler Bass. This class will consist of a brief overview of this data and analyses, and ponder their meaning for us, as a congregation of (primarily) White American Christians, who still find church attendance and membership meaningful. Though some may find it helpful to read or peruse the books, it will not be necessary for participation in discussion of these trends and their impact on us.

This fall the Faith & Values class asks "What do I think about... and how does my faith inform me?" We'll be discussing how Christians, and specifically Lutherans, think about some issues that are close to the heart and topical.

## Pastor Pretz's Bible Study (Room 118)

**"Today's Gospel Study"** will be the title of Pastor Jeff Pretz' Bible Study sessions during the Sunday School hour. Each Sunday we will look at the Gospel Lesson appointed for the day and look for more insights and applications that may or may not parallel the sermons of the day. We will be meeting in the room 118, which is past the bathrooms, down the ramp and immediate right and through the doors to the third door on the right. Bring your own Bible and any other resource you would like to bring. We will begin on September 11<sup>th</sup> at 9:15 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. The first session will be looking at Luke 15:1-10, the appointed Gospel for the 17<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Pentecost (Lectionary 24). This is not a series of prepared studies, but will be our informal study and reflections. Everyone is welcome!

## Our World, God's Eyes (Cry Room)

How would Jesus react to our priorities, worries, doubts, lifestyles, etc.? Using the Nooma video series as a basis, we explore challenging and joyful circumstances in our lives through God's eyes. Join us as we continue the journey and seek to see common events through His perspective as we strive to live a God-centered life. Join us during the Sunday School Hour in the Cry Room.

## Fall Wednesday Morning Bible Study

Mark your calendar now for **Wednesday, September 14<sup>th</sup>** for our first Wednesday Morning Bible Study Class of the fall. This year we will again have a two-semester system in which we study two different topics. We will start the year exploring the topic <u>How the Bible</u> <u>Came to Be</u>, and examine the complicated process of story-telling, oral tradition, and scribing that has led to this magnificent book that never grows old and continues to speak to modern generations of people. Following that excursion of a few weeks, we will enter the



book of Genesis in the mid-fall for the remainder of the year, as we examine the foundations of our faith through the patriarchs and the formation of the people of God.

Why not consider joining this vibrant group of 40-50 fellow believers this fall as we study familiar material in ways that always open up faith discussion, historical reflection, and theological questions. We have a strong class that has the involvement of both church members and community members, which creates an atmosphere that is rife with conversation and insights offered from both leaders and participants. Pastor Ross facilitates the class which meets in the Café on Wednesdays from 9:30-11:00 a.m. Friends are welcome. Modest snacks and drinks are provided.

## From your Health & Wellness Committee

#### NATIONAL CHILDHOOD OBESITY AWARENESS MONTH

September is National Childhood Obesity Awareness Month, and the Health and Wellness Committee wants to call to your attention some alarming statistics.

- One in 3 children in the United States is overweight or obese
- Childhood obesity puts kids at risk for health problems that were once seen only in adults, like type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure, and heart disease.

The good news? Childhood obesity can be prevented!! Communities, health professionals, and families can work together to create opportunities for kids to eat healthier and get more active. St. Peters has tried to do this by placing some healthy options on our Sunday goodie tables during social time.

Here are just a few ideas you can incorporate into your and children's lives:

- Encourage families to make small changes, like keeping fresh fruit/veggies within reach, and going on a family walk after dinner.

## Mark Aho's Visit to Busoka

Here is the initial report provided by Mark Aho upon his return from visiting the Konde Diocese and Busoka Lutheran Church (our companion congregation) this past July. It is extremely interesting and well worth the read. Mark will expand his report with pictures and videos at the World Hunger Initiative luncheon to be held after late service on **Sunday**, **October 16.** He will also be speaking at various other church functions/activities in the near future.

Konde Diocese - Busoka Visit: Summary narrative Mark Aho August 1, 2016

Busoka is both a village name and the designation for a central church location within the Konde Diocese Central District. The church building is located in the Busoka village area but the pastoral duties include 9 "preaching points" surrounding Busoka divided into 2 sections for administrative purposes. The current "pastor" is actually an Evangelist which is a title representing training less than a full pastor. The Diocese has a shortage of full pastors so some locations are staffed with an Evangelist. (I will refer to the pastor position for either of these). *(continued on next page)*

Church services are held every Sunday at Busoka however it is only periodically that all the preaching points are asked to gather there as they did for my visit. Otherwise the pastor makes rounds to all the preaching points in rotation. When a pastor is not at a preaching point, lay leaders lead the Sunday service. The church purchased a small 150cc motorcycle for the pastor.

The village region of 9 preaching points has an estimated population of about 750 with over 100 orphans. All figures are approximate as no one seems to have an exact tally. Busoka is part of the Konde Central District that has 13 congregations. Each of the 7 Konde Districts has a presiding District Pastor reporting to the Assistant to the Bishop.

Central - Rev. Bernard Mwangobola - based in Itete (does not speak English) Southern - Rev John Mwasakilali - (Pastor John whom we have met and who translated for me)

The alter parament St. Peter's donated was presented at the church service as were T-shirts for the church council and a verbal description of other donations. The rest of the gifts were discussed and distributed at a meeting in the pastor's house with the Partnership Committee (soccer balls, towels, soap, kitchen utensils, \$600 for orphan education and pastor house work). In addition, pads and pens went to the local primary school, pastor stoles went to the Diocese and doilies were used for those hosting us at various locations.

The orphans sang a thank you song, participating in a special meal on Sunday after church and in their new shoes. A St Peter's member donated a sizable sum specifically for new shoes. Each child was allowed to go to a nearby village market and select their own shoes.

Busoka got an electricity line, paid for by the church, only last November. It goes only to the church, church office and pastor's house. The village has no electricity or in-house plumbing. There is water to several central taps which is fed by gravity through plastic pipes from a nearby river. Water will be supplied directly into the pastor's house soon.

The pastor's house is incomplete. They were finishing up a septic system as I was there and are working to finish inside bathrooms. The roof has a leak from the initial installation that needs to be fixed and there are no ceiling boards yet - rooms open to the roof rafters. The kitchen has not been started - cooking is still done in a separate thatch roofed kitch-en/chicken coop combo next door. The walls have yet to be painted. Work progresses only as funds are available as loans are not generally available. The Evangelist, his 2 daughters and 1 son live there. His wife passed away earlier this year.

The last of the 3 church buildings is the church house which contains the church secretary office and supplies of building materials and dried corn.

While the Busoka region is very cash poor the climate is good for growing crops year round. Some land is set aside for the pastor and church while individuals farm land surrounding their homes. Crops range from corn, beans, cassava, bananas, cacao, coffee, peanuts, mango, avocado, yam, sugar cane, papaya and millet. There is some irrigation from the river water that is piped in. The soil has average fertility - ok but not great. Crops are generally grown seasonally and mixed in the fields. Labor is all manual and very time consuming. There is enough to keep most people fed decently but little surplus and very little meat. Chickens are common and eggs are consumed by most. Rice and ugala (a processed corn meal porridge of sorts) are staples with rice being grown in the lowlands around Lake Nyassa in this region.

A small building with a mechanical corn sheller and grinder was recently built. The idea is to try to process and sell any corn surplus but Busoka's remote location and poor road access makes this questionable with other villages better located doing the same thing.

The church choirs were amazing with traditional dances having been adapted to christian worship. Most congregations have 3 or more choirs. Youth, fellowship, worship, etc. Offerings are taken by people walking up and putting their offering in wooden containers. They may be more that once during the service - one for contributions toward pledges or tithes and one for general donations. People have personalized folders in a rack that they take, use and put back every week. Those who do not have cash offer crops, animals and other goods that are then publicly auctioned after the service so that the church ends up with cash.

There is a great deal more to report in terms of the government, Konde activities, education system, healthcare and Tanzania in general but this should provide background of Busoka and start the information sharing. Lots more to come!!!

## **Letter From the Vicar**



To all of God's beloved at St. Peter's Lutheran Church. Grace and peace to you from our Lord Jesus Christ.

Phillip Clayton, in his book *Science and Religion: The Basics* stated that, "Religion is so basic to human history that the human species has been called *Homo religious*, the religious animal. That being said, few topics over the last 500 years have inspired as much heated debate as the relationship between religion and science. In the first part of the 17th century it was firmly held that the earth was the center of the universe and every other celestial body revolved around the earth. Galileo challenged this firmly held belief by illustrating that our solar system is just that, a heliocentric system where Earth and all the other bodies within this system orbit a star, our sun. Galileo was convicted of heresy by the church for his accurate illustration of our solar system and spent the rest of his life under house arrest until his death in 1642.

Much has changed since then, but the debate over the relationship between religion and science rages on. Every aspect of our lives are influenced by science in some way, from our toothpaste, to our food, to the very candles and sound system we use to worship God each and every Sunday. The importance of science in our lives would be impossible to over -estimate. While there are those on both sides of the debate that claim there can be no cooperative relationship between religion and science, there are currently a host of scientists and theologians including Ernest Simmons who uses the scientific concepts of quantum entanglement as a way to help us understand the very complicated religious concept of the Trinity; or Francis Collins, the head of the Human Genome project in the 1990's who sees the *language of God* within our 6 billion character genetic code. These scientists and theologians see science and religion as different sides of the same coin recognizing an inherent and even symbiotic relationship between the two. After all, it was Albert Einstein who said in the second part of an essay entitled *Religion and Science* in 1941that, "...Science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind."

I share the opinion of many of these scientists and theologians and hold that one can agree and work within the realm of science as well as the realm of faith at the same time. Additionally, the concepts within the theory of evolution and the big bang theory are in no way contradictory to a faithful Christian belief. Science and religion not only can but should be in open dialogue because each ask and seek to answer questions that the other does not. After all, one aspect of science is that it seeks to understand how this amazing universe that we are blessed to live in works. If we hold that this amazing universe is the creation and work of God, then the scientific principles, theories, and laws we discover were also set in motion by God and the study of such can also be prayerful and faithful in the Christian life.

"For it is he who gave me unerring knowledge of what exists, to know the structure of the world and the activity of the elements; the beginning and the end and middle of times, the alternations of the solstices and the changes of the seasons, the cycles of the year and the constellations of the stars, the natures of animals and the tempers of wild animals, the powers of spirits and the thoughts of human beings, the varieties of plants and the virtues of roots; I learned both what is secret and what is manifest, for wisdom, the fashioner of all things taught me." (Wis 7:17-22)

Over the coming year here at St. Peter's I will be addressing various questions that naturally arise when addressing science and faith as part of my internship project. Included in this will be Sunday school classes, a short-term book club, blog, and podcasts. I look forward to wrestling with these various questions alongside you over the coming months.

## From the Director of Music



#### Singing the Psalms

When we gather for worship on Sundays, we almost always hear from the Psalms. This 'hymnbook of the Bible' is a resource full of rich imagery. From psalms of thanksgiving to psalms of lament, these songs are representative of a wide range of responses to the human condition. It is fitting that the designers of the Revised Common Lectionary, the schedule of readings we use on Sunday mornings, chose psalms as responses to the first reading every week.

For example, Sunday, September 18th, we read in Amos that God warns those who deal unfavorably with the poor:

Hear this, you that trample on the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land... The Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob: Surely I will never forget any of their deeds.

The psalm for the day, Psalm 113, continues the theme, this time focusing on God's response to the poor. We sing:

The Lord takes up the weak out of the dust and lifts up the poor from the ashes, enthroning them with the rulers, with the rulers of the people.

So, these two excerpts work together to show two sides of the same situation. After hearing of God's warning, our response as a community is to sing of God's faithfulness and mercy to the poor. You'll notice that I just said we sing these words. This is important! As I mentioned at the beginning, this is our first hymnbook and these words are meant to be expressed through music. But how do we do this at St. Peter's?

We have a variety of ways to sing the psalms. At our traditional services, we primarily alternate by whole verse with a cantor or choir singing one verse of the psalm to a tone and the congregation the next verse. The goal in singing psalms is for the pace of the text to be as natural and free-flowing as is possible. Imagine, if you will, that singing a psalm to a tone is like a galloping horse. If you look at the main body of the horse, it is always moving forward. Yet, if you look at its legs, you can see exactly when each one strikes the ground. The legs are the individual words of the psalm, each one having its own space. The body of the horse is the phrase constantly moving forward to its ending.



Alternating verses isn't the only way we sing the psalms. Sometimes, the choir will sing the verses of a psalm in a more difficult setting, while the congregation sings a composed refrain throughout. Still, other times the choir will sing a psalm composed in a more formal setting. Sometimes the congregation and choirs will sing a hymn out of the hymnal that is a paraphrase of the psalm text for the day. In fact, some hymnals are made up only of these psalm paraphrases. Hymnals don't have the corner on the market, though, when it comes to singing the psalms. There are a number of contemporary songs with texts from the psalms. At our own New Day service, the prayers are couched in song with the intention to mirror psalmody.

With such a variety of ways to proclaim the psalms, it's clear they have been a source of creativity over the centuries. Joining our voices together in these poems of praise and lament connect us to the thanksgivings and tragedies experienced by humankind throughout the generations. Singing the psalms also reminds us of God's constancy in times good and bad. This fall we get our voices galloping again by singing the psalms and praising the Lord. Giddyup!
