Live Streaming at New Day

During the months of July and August there will be a trial period where the New Day Praise service will be live streamed and can be found at streamed and can be found at stream.org/live and str

During the April Communications Committee meeting some conversation arose about viewing worship online. Similar conversations have been had in the Worship Committee. In the Worship Committee setting, the conversation focused toward our Traditional service. Our Director of Music, Adam Lefever Hughes, did some research on licenses and copyright and found that streaming is a bit complicated for the Traditional setting due to the various licenses needed for liturgy, hymns, and anthems. The Communications Committee asked the New Day Committee to research the possibility of streaming in the New Day setting. Our praise band leader, Erik Teichmann, did some similar research into the licenses needed for the New Day service and found that our current CCLI license covers all the music used at New Day, with the addition of a \$65/year streaming license add-on. The Proclaim projection software may be used to stream and record the service incorporating slide images and live audio of the worship service.

With the software and licenses in place, New Day Praise will run a trial streaming period for the months of July and August. The Communications Committee and the New Day Committee both wanted to explore the questions of interest in streaming opportunities for worship and beyond. There is hope that from this exploration, questions about future streaming opportunities may be further examined.

COMMENDATION PRESENTED TO SISTER DOTTIE ALMONEY LUTHERAN DAY OF ADVOCACY 2018 MONDAY, MAY 21, 2018

Sister Dottie Almoney is a consecrated deacon in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and a member of the ELCA Deaconess Community. As a member of the Diaconate, she is

called to serve at the intersection of Word and world, bearing the hope of Christ, serving those in need, and equipping others to work for peace, justice, and healing. As Vice Chair of the Board of Directors of the Deaconess Community of the ELCA, Sister Dottie leads and serves in an intentional community of women from across our denomination. In her call as Director of Education and Outreach at St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Lancaster, Sister Dottie embodies the Deaconess Community's call to "equip all people to live into their baptismal identity as God's beloved, bringing the needs of the world into the church's awareness, and equipping the church to serve God's creation."

At St. Peter's, Sister Dottie is responsible for the faith formation and education of youth from grade five through adulthood. She also oversees the congregation's local and global ministries, its safe church program, and its fellowship ministry. More recently, she has started a group interested in advocacy.

St. Peter's congregants benefit from the educational curriculum she crafts with an emphasis on building bridges between our faith and human suffering in our communities and the world. Believing that stories from scripture can help connect us, Sister Dottie encourages people to look at world events through what she calls a "Gospel lens." Through her creative, spiritual approach, youth and adults alike learn that loving our neighbors as ourselves is more than an abstract proposition. Rather, she teaches and models that it is an imperative of real meaning that requires a response.

In her faith walk, Sister Dottie exemplifies the old African Proverb, "When you pray, move your feet," because her entreaties to God are always followed up by action in the real world. In advocacy, she not only prays for change, but also gets her feet moving to educate the unaware, awake the slumbering, inspire the concerned, and prod to action the people, especially public officials, who can and should make a difference.

Sister Dottie pours her heart and soul into serving others for the sake of Christ, whether it's collaborating ecumenically with local partners to create Lydia's Closet (which provides clothes, toiletries and school supplies for Lancaster residents experiencing poverty) or working tirelessly to raise awareness about and help stop human trafficking locally and globally.

Not merely an individual doer, Sister Dottie is also a community-builder and equipper. Believing that everyone, no matter how young or old, or rich or poor, has something of value to contribute, she inspires, gathers and helps others to fully discern and live out their vocational call as Christians in the world.

Her vision and approach are evident in her role as chair of our synod Global Missions Committee, where Sister Dottie has broadened the emphasis from merely generating support for our church's work around the world to exploring and teaching about the root causes of problems affecting our brothers and sisters in other countries.

Truly, community is found in many forms-be it sisters in the Deaconess Community or disciples in local congregations. Building bridges and connecting communities are keys to advocacy and ministry. Sister Dottie sums up these sentiments well in her sermon commentary on the parable of the wedding guest from Matthew 22:11-14:

We too are called to this radical banquet called the Kingdom of God, and it requires more than just a positive response to the invitation. Showing up isn't enough, but we need to clothe ourselves in Christ, become active participants in this kingdom, not just spectators sitting at a banquet table waiting to be served!

For all that she is, all that she does, for her caring heart, her loving devotion and passion in providing a voice for the powerless and least among us, we honor Sister Dottie. May her work continue to stir us all to see the world through a "Gospel lens" that breaks our hearts and compels us to pray with moving feet.

World Hunger Fund at Work in East Africa

Sometimes when we give to an offering, we don't know where the money goes. In honor of Mother's Day, on May 13, here are two articles about women being helped by your World Hunger Fund offerings, one in Kenya, and one in Tanzania. We hope you enjoy these stories.

Promoting Girls' Rights and Education in Kenya

Evelyne first connected with the Kenya Evangelical Lutheran Church (KELC) women's work through a seminar in her congregation in Naserian Mission. Here she learned about girls' rights, the importance of education, and support networks available to women and girls in Kenya. Just a few weeks later, Evelyne needed to access those support networks when her father informed her that he had arranged for her to marry an older man in their community. Evelyne was only 14 years old. She wanted to continue her education, and she did not want to be married.

Evelyne called many people looking for help to escape this situation, but at first found no one to assist her. Eventually she contacted Alice Mwaringa, the KELC Women's Department coordinator. Alice quickly found a way to remove Evelyne from her home and take her to a safe place. With help from many people within the KELC women's network, Evelyne was welcomed into the home of a family near Mombasa and enrolled in a nearby secondary school.

Now in her last year of school, Evelyne has been selected as Head Girl and her teachers praise her for her hard work and good scores. Evelyne is hoping to continue her education by going to university to study accounting.

Evelyne has also been welcomed back into her family home, where she had been barred from returning, after refusing her arranged marriage. Over several years, and with intervention and counseling from KELC leaders and community elders, Evelyne's father has accepted her decision to pursue education instead of marriage. At the end of last year, Evelyne's father invited her home, where he gave her a blessing for her future and success in her schooling.

We thank God for Evelyne's strength and achievements and we pray for equity and justice for all girls in Kenya and around the world.

Jane's Story: A Person Living with HIV/AIDS Becomes a Peer Counselor and National Health Advocate

Jane Mwalyego, the widowed mother of four, lost her husband to HIV/AIDS in 2002. Jane was diagnosed with HIV just before her husband's death. At that time, due to the stigma attached to HIV/AIDS, her husband's family disowned her and her children. Bereaved and heartbroken, Jane and her children had to travel 1500 kilometers (almost 1000 miles) from Musoma, her husband's home village, to Mbeya where she settled at her brother's home. There her health quickly deteriorated and she became bedridden. In 2005, a Palliative Care team from the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Tanzania (ELCT) learned of her case and began to visit her regularly. They nursed her bed sores, managed her pain holistically, and provided counseling. In 2008 she moved to Arusha, in northern Tanzania, where she began Antiretroviral Therapy. Sadly, her eldest, a teen-age son, died of HIV/AIDS around this time. In Arusha, she continued to receive Palliative Care services, including bereavement counseling and psychosocial support, from Selian Lutheran Hospice. By 2015, she had recovered her strength and was invited to attend training for homebased care volunteers so that she could help other patients in her situation to face life again. Although Jane has only a primary school education, she became one of the best peer counselors in the region for patients and families affected with HIV/AIDS.

With a small loan, Jane started to do small scale farming for vegetables and other nutritional crops. Today she has a small business selling a variety of healthy nutritional products from which she earns a good in-

for her children; one of them recently graduated as a teacher while her youngest is completing her university degree at Dar es Salaam University. In September 2017 Jane had the privilege of testifying before members of the Tanzanian Parliament to advocate for the availability of better Palliative Care services throughout Tanzania.

Spring is finally here and summer isn't far behind. Time to think about skin care!

We know with warmer weather comes longer days with more frequent, and more intense, sunshine. While every dermatologist will tell you the importance of wearing sunscreen year round, they all agree that it's even more important during the warmer months. The UVA/UVB rays can be more intense and the damage

to your skin accumulates over your lifetime. Using a high-SPF sunscreen: 30 SPF at minimum, can reduce the accumulation of chronic UV damage that's linked to non-melanoma skin cancer and aging, (you know – those wrinkles and 'age' spots).

And, even though it's trendy to wear those beanies year round, they don't offer any protection when it comes to shielding your face from the sun. Hats play an even more important role. A broad-brimmed hat provides excellent sun protection for the skin-cancer prone areas such as the face, neck, scalp and ears. Look for a tightly woven hat that has at least a two-inch brim, to provide the best protection.

Melanoma, the most serious of skin cancers, is on the rise! Please enjoy the warmth of being outdoors, but also take care of yourself, and your skin.

Pastor's Letter

It is the time of the year when I start to long for the slower days of summer, and a little more reading which refuels my mental tank with new ideas and language. In recent years I have shared what is typically an eclectic list of reading goals for my summer, knowing full well that I will add some books that have yet to arise on my reading horizon, and discard some books whose luster will fade by the time I pull them off my book shelf. So, here are some of my planned reads for the coming months. I'd love to know what you are planning to read, also ... let me know.

<u>Awed to Heaven, Rooted in Earth</u>, by Walter Brueggemann – A collection of prayers that emerged from Brueggemann's 35 years of teaching in seminaries that reflect a wide

range of life experiences.

Me Talk Pretty One Day, by Dave Sedaris -- A new collection of satirical stories with the blithely sophisticated, loopy humor that his fans have come to expect.

<u>Into the Magic Shop</u>, by James Doty – An autobiographical account of a struggling boy who wanders into a magic shop looking for a plastic thumb and instead met Ruth, a woman who teaches him the unique relationship between the brain and the heart.

<u>Nudge</u>, by Richard Thayer -- Every day we make choices—about what to buy or eat, about financial investments or our children's health and education. Unfortunately, we often choose poorly. Nudge is about how we make these choices and how we can make better ones.

<u>Chuck Noll: His Life's Work</u>, by Michael MacCambridge -- In this biography, based on deep research and hundreds of interviews, the author takes the measure of the man, painting an intimate portrait of one of the most important figures in American football history.

<u>The Cyber Effect</u>, by Mary Aiken -- the world's leading expert in forensic cyberpsychology, offers a starting point for all future conversations about how the Internet is shaping development and behavior, societal norms and values, children, safety, privacy, and our perception of the world.

<u>Thunderhead</u>, by Neal Shusterman – A sequel to the dystopian novel, Scythe, a story of a society in which people do not die naturally, and thus must be "gleaned" by a professional guild of assassins called "scythes." This fulfills my yearly foray into the Young Adult bestseller world.

<u>12 Rules for Life</u>, by Jordan Peterson – What does everyone in the modern world need to know? Peterson's answer to this most difficult of questions combines the hard-won truths of ancient tradition with the stunning revelations of cutting-edge scientific research.

I also am overdue to read the Hobbit & Lord of the Rings trilogy. If you are looking for a provocative and well researched blog of books both for adults and children, check out <u>BrainPickings.org</u>. It continues to impress me with the depth of its analysis of both adult and children's books.

Letter From the Vicar

Erős vár a mi Istenünk! [A Mighty Fortress is our God!]



My time here at St. Peter's comes to an end on June 17th. I feel that I have accomplished my goals and learned much during my internship. Thank you all for the love, support, prayers, and all the opportunities I was given to learn and grow as I prepare to complete my seminary studies in Word and Sacrament!

For those of you who volunteered to participate in a survey of my internship project, the series of *Crosspoints* classes under the umbrella title Co-Existing with World Beliefs, I thank you for your input. Four presentations were given: myself on Hinduism and Buddhism on February 18th, Rabbi Rami Pavolotzky on Judaism on February 25th, Scott Rhoades on Atheism and Secular Humanism on March 4th, and Mukaram Syed on Islam on March 11th. On the presentations, the ratings for Hinduism/Buddhism, Islam, and Atheism/Secular Humanism were practically even between okay, good, and excellent. The presentation on Judaism was most positively received with it receiving mostly excellent ratings with some good ratings. Comments on the Islam presentation noted that Mr. Syed appeared to be evasive and mild when he spoke about Islam associated with terrorism and extremism while another comment noted that Mr. Syed was not accurate on some issues he presented. On Atheism/Secular Humanism, the comments included how useful and interesting the information was and that it was good to hear the views coming from a member of that community to make people more aware and knowledgeable. Another comment noted that it was good to learn the distinction between atheism and secular humanism. Overall, several comments noted the lack of discussion on similarities between the topics of the presenters and Christianity, and that this would have made the presentations more useful. However, it was acknowledged that this was the reason for the having the handouts and that there was a time constraint for each presentation to be completed within an hour that prevented those discussions from being included. The information in the handouts was viewed as good to outstanding while the suggested reading/viewing handout either did not have any usefulness or was considered a good resource. The promotion of the series of classes was considered for the most part either good or outstanding. On the impact of the classes on attendees, most felt it was good and several felt it was outstanding. The classes were thought -provoking and also made some think about the issues they had with Christianity. Another comment noted it was good to see how others view God that our (Christian) thinking is not the only way to God. Another comment pointed out that awareness of other religions/beliefs is so important for wiping out prejudice and hate. Most of the responses on whether the series accomplished its goal of educating and facilitating discussion on co-existence indicated mostly good with some outstanding ratings. One comment suggested that it would have been good to have a separate follow-on session without any of the guest speakers just to discuss the entire series as a way to mutually develop how we, as a Christian community, can work on co-existing. As for the overall rating of the series, the majority rating was good with several outstanding ratings. One comment noted that this series was definitely an important as well as timely topic to be discussed.
