Constitution Update

If you attended our Annual Congregational Meeting on November 11th, you might be asking yourself "what just happened?" regarding some of the votes we took relating to our church constitution and bylaws. Maybe even if you didn't attend, you have heard friends talking about it. In the interest of total transparency, we want to try to clear up some of the confusion. You may find the "Constitution Update," a comprehensive explanation prepared by our parliamentarian, Leslie McCarthy, along with her email address for follow-up questions on our website stpetersluthan.org. If you prefer a paper copy, you may request one from our office, as well.

We encourage you to read the document if you are interested in all of the details regarding what transpired. In the meantime, here's a quick summary of what happened.

The short answer is that we made a mistake. We missed a provision in our bylaws that says that any proposed amendment to the bylaws needs to be presented in writing to Council 60 days before the meeting. That didn't happen, so we shouldn't have even been voting on the proposed amendments in the first place (check out the "Constitution Update" document for details about the amendments). Because our vote on the overall constitution mistakenly assumed that these amendments had been added, we believe it is necessary for us to vote again. We deeply apologize for this error, as we want to be good stewards of your time.

One of the lessons your rostered leaders and your lay leaders have learned is that even when a lot of time is invested in updating the church's constitution, and when your time has been invested in reading and listening to the updates about the constitution, details can still be missed and errors can be made. The poet Alexander Pope wrote "To err is Human; to Forgive, Divine." The leadership is aware of the procedural missteps we made, and ask for your grace as we rectify some of the mistakes. We also ask for your thoughts, your questions, and your presence at the upcoming meeting in February.

Which brings us to next time! We are working hard to make this right, so we can have a simple and efficient meeting that meets all of the requirements to approve the constitution that our committee has worked on diligently for so many months. We are reaching out to those who proposed amendments and to others who expressed concerns, we are reviewing parliamentary procedure, and we are highlighting the sections of our constitution that pertain to voting. Soon, you will hear about a new date (probably in February) where we will vote again to approve constitutional changes to send to the synod for review. Along with the meeting date, you will receive information about any amendments that will be proposed at that time. You will have at least 60 days to review all of the material before you vote and plenty of time to ask questions.

We understand that this has been a confusing and frustrating time, and we thank you for being part of "getting things right." We look forward to formalizing our new and improved constitution in 2019!

The Wonders of Christmas


The quietness of falling snow The lights in windows all aglow The doors of churches open wide Beckoning all to come inside.

MANAGING STRESS

Pay attention to your level of stress, which may increase during busy times, like the holidays, or times of change. Stress is a physical and emotional response to overwhelming responsibilities, events, and changes. When you're faced with stress, hormones (chemicals in your

body) may trigger changes in your body. For instance, your * Heart may pound * Blood pressure may rise *Stomach may become tense and * Muscles may tighten.

Stressors (the effects of stress) may include the following:

- Adapting to constant, rapid change.
- Worries about your finances and the economy.
- Handling a major life event, such as changing jobs or moving to a new home. Even positive life changes, such as getting married or the birth of a child, often cause stress.
- Juggling many roles and responsibilities.
- Going from one stressful situation to the next without taking time to relax. Even keeping up with our cell phone messages, e-mails, and text messages!

If you're often under stress, you need to learn to manage it well. Stress can affect your well-being. Over time, you may show some of the symptoms listed below.

- Physical effects: You may have frequent colds or flu, headaches, or trouble sleeping or you may have trouble with digestion.
- Mental effects: You may have trouble concentrating or remembering.
- Emotional effects: You may feel anxious, depressed, angry, or irritable.
- Behavioral effects: Too much stress may lead you to eat poorly, or turn to drugs/alcohol.

Basic Stress Management Suggestions:

Regular Physical Activity—Take a brisk walk or do something else that is active. Regular physical activity is best for reducing stress.

Problem Solving—Learn problem solving skills! They can improve your ability to cope.

Relaxation Training—Learn relaxation and mindfulness skills. These skills can help you to notice and manage the responses in your body that come with stress. Daily relaxation may protect you from some of the consequences of stress.

Time Management—List what needs to get done, make plans for addressing issues, and stick to the plan.

Positive Thinking—Stress is often associated with negative thinking. Focus your attention on positive thoughts.

Pleasant Activities—You may be feeling the effects of stress if you are not making time for fun in your life. Plan to have regular, enjoyable activities and see if this reduces your stress.

Pastor's Letter

"Can We Tawk?"

("Coffee Talk" ladies, SNL skit, circa 1992-94)

<u>Can We Tawk, Part 1</u> – Advent is a season of anticipation. We wait for Jesus' arrival in the manger in Bethlehem ... and we await Jesus' arrival at the end of all days, when God writes the final chapter on earth and the rest of the created universe, and ushers in the Kingdom of God in its fullest and most comprehensive form. Thus the themes of "waiting and

watching" run full bore during the four-week Advent season which leads us to the edge of the cradle, ankle deep in straw and every other muck that accompanies that straw in a working stable. As such, one cannot talk about Jesus' coming to us at Christmas and the last days, without at least thinking about Jesus' regular coming to us in the sacrament of the Altar. Some of our Eucharistic prayers offer this congregational affirmation, "We proclaim the Lord's death until He comes." Others offer it in simpler language ... "Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ will come again." So if we yearn for Jesus' coming in the future, and cherish the memory of his first coming, it is inevitable to yearn for and cherish Jesus' coming in the sacrament of Holy Communion.

Can We Tawk, Part 2 – In recent months, I have offered a few passing comments about this yearning and cherishing of the Sacrament of the Altar in some sermons. I may have also done the same in conversation around the new Vision Statement we approved at last month's Annual Meeting. In reflecting on our Vision Statement's intentions to "develop a meaningful relationship with God" and "model our faith", I cannot help but recognize the gift of Christ's real presence in the Eucharist as the most reliable resource for that kind of modeling and relationship building. If you have been around St. Peter's for a while, you are aware that this is not a new discussion for us. We "stirred the pot" of conversation back in the mid-to-late 1990's on this same topic. At that time, we celebrated communion on the first Sunday of the month and festivals. So this is not new language for me, but is language I have let lapse since the building of our new addition in 2005. In light of some of the other priorities that were more compelling for me and (in my judgment) the congregation as well, as we lived into this new building that brought with it all kinds of new possibilities for ministry. Our vision statement has gotten the language back into my head.

Can We Tawk, Part 3 – Having said all this, we (your rostered leaders, Worship Committee, Council) have no immediate specific plans for actively moving into a timeline for establishing weekly communion at all our services. We have no process in mind, nor any timeline that we are following. I am quite simply exercising the calling of my pastoral office to share with you one of the many rhythms of faith that compel me at the moment, and getting it back on the table of discussion. If and when we have a plan for addressing the issue of weekly communion, you will be the first to know, after it has been vetted through the Worship Committee and Council. For the moment we are just "tawking." And I would invite you to do the same. With your family members, your friends, your church leaders, your pastors ... and hey, a few words with God wouldn't be such a bad idea either, right? Send us an email ... write us a note ... sit down with us ... let us know what you think. But there is no secret agenda that we are trying to sneak by you. I can only speak for myself in saying, that ain't how I operate. If you know me, you know that. So ... can we tawk? Absolutely! Till then, I'll ...

Dear friends in Christ.

The other day I was in a music planning meeting—and it was my favorite kind of music planning meeting—because we were planning Advent and Christmas music. I love Advent and Christmas music. There's nothing like listening to youth sing carols at the top of their lungs, hearing a congregation sing "Silent Night" surrounded by candlelight, or the guy in line next to you humming his favorite Christmas song.

I believe music speaks deeply to our faith, our story, and our very soul. It is one of the reasons why this Advent we are creating a video devotional series focusing on music and how music gifts us with faith, hope, and love during this time of year. (So stay tuned)

One of my (new) favorite hymns is *Love Has Come*. You can find it in the hymnal as hymn 292. With the tune *Un Flambeau* (or in English *Bring A Torch, Janette Isabella*), we sing these verses:

- v.1 Love has come, a light in the darkness!
 Love explodes in the Bethlehem skies.
 See, all heaven has come to proclaim it.
 Hear how their song of joy arises:
 Love! Love! Born unto you, a Savior!
 Love! Love! Glory to God on high!
- v.3 Love has come, He never will leave us!
 Love is life everlasting and free.
 Love is Jesus within and among us.
 Love is the peace our hearts are seeking.
 Love! Love! Love is the gift of Christmas.
 Love! Love! Praise to You, God on high!
- v.2 Love is born! Come share in the wonder.
 Love is God now asleep in the hay.
 See the glow in the eyes of His mother.
 What is the name her heart is saying?
 Love! Love! Love is the name she whispers.
 Love! Love! Jesus, Immanuel.

Love is Jesus within and among us. Yes, indeed this is love!

In the letter from 1 John 4:7-8 we read, "Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love." In the Gospel of John we read "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." -John 1:14

Yes, love with flesh on came into the world in order to save us from ourselves, and now this love dwells and lives within and among us. The other day I came across a post from the author Anne Lamott where she wrote, "We can be love with skin on."

Letter From the Vicar

Dear Congregation,

Conversations about weakness, failure and fear frequently take place among Jesus and his followers. But in church, we silently confess our sins. We look to God as individuals and accept our share of corporate forgiveness. Although surrounded, most of us stand alone in the privacy of our weakness, failures and fears. Conversations about such things are rare/uncomfortable.

St. Peter's responds well to crisis. The congregation rises to generosity, as needed.

If you're able to attend church, you can attest to at least one simple blessing: looking forward to a baked good on Sunday morning. Personally, I duck in and grab, then run to my office in a state of transition. The obvious risk to approaching the coffee bar is engaging in conversation. Many of you successfully avoid this risk, completely.

As your church and community volunteer efforts have become apparent, so has your heart of compassion. Members seem willing to share concerns with pastors and the prayer team, but I wonder... what is St. Peter's climate for openly sharing physical, emotional or spiritual hurts? It seems to me (for the most part) that you are private people travelling in public spheres.

Through various surveys and spiritual inventories you have helped cultivate and nurture faith community that extends beyond our church walls. We have seen how community achieves what individuals cannot.

Yet, individually, every member faces the threat of loneliness and isolation. Talk of hardship and questions about daily life often go unspoken or unheard. Mutual beliefs and faith practices bind our associations as congregants. Worship liturgy joins us together, even when our values and other defining characteristics markedly differ. But, every generation is struggling to find purpose and meaning.

Being in a state of transition has become the new constant, regardless of age, gender, employment status, or state of independence. Society promotes unhealthy coping mechanisms in the form of indulgence. Marketers offer prescriptive cures and regimens whenever crises keep us from functioning optimally. It's time for confession.

Ever wonder why so little time is alloted for silent confession at the beginning of worship? In those few seconds, only my most recent sins surface. They're usually the same, week after week: pride, fear and anger. What are yours? Can we begin to have open conversations about weakness, failure and fears? (Things God talks about openly, all the time?)

Begin your holiday preparations in this new way, now. Discover a new type of authentic joy and mutual gifting.



From the Director of Music

Beginning at the End

It's funny how beginnings and endings often coincide. For a new thing to begin, often an old thing must pass away. We start new jobs after leaving our old ones. The new year comes about as the old one ends. The month of December brings about many endings and begin-

nings. We look toward the coming of the new calendar year, but in the church, we also look at a new liturgical year.



Yet, I have often felt that joy is all the more potent when set in relief by sorrow. Perhaps you do too. Laughter amidst tears, hope and despair, life and death. These may all seem like opposites, but often we find that each one needs its partner to mean something. The church is a lot like this. We sing of awaiting a heavenly kingdom ("come, thou long-expected Jesus") but we also proclaim that God is already ruler of all. We sing of Jesus the Lamb of God and Jesus the Good Shepherd. We sing of Jesus' death on a cross and Jesus, risen, bringing in the kingdom. We hold these things together because together they mean more that way than each one does on its own.

However, its not as if we suddenly pretend Jesus hasn't been born yet because it's Advent. We simply cannot go about our daily lives without any expectation that God will come into our lives because we know where the story is going. We know Jesus comes to us in the stable and what Jesus will go on to do for us. Instead, we live through Advent with hopeful expectation that God will continue to break into this world again and again.

The message of Advent is not that we are waiting for Jesus to be born. The message of Advent is that we joyfully expect God to continue to break into our world in unexpected ways. It's even bigger than our own time and place, though. We look toward those end times, the last days, when God will come to the world one final time to enfold all within God's care. Weeping and sorrow will be no more and our hopes and expectations will come to fruition. We look for God's coming now, but also look toward God's final arrival to this broken world

This Advent, we joyfully sing of our expectation that God will come into our lives. We willingly call for God to stir up his power and come. We light candles, pray together, and hold our breath as we await that glorious day when Jesus will enter every heart.
