<u>Ukrainian Easter Eggs</u>



During the Lenten and Easter seasons, there will be a display of Easter Eggs in our narthex curio cabinet. These eggs, known as *Pysanky* (Ukrainian verb: to write), were created by Marilyn Collins, Jean Haus, Beryl Swisher, Beth May, Carol Esbenshade and Nancy Ross. The custom of egg decorating started in pre-Christian times and the decorated eggs were a celebration of Spring and the rebirth of life. With the advent of Christianity, the symbolism of the egg was changed to represent, not nature's rebirth, but the rebirth of man. Christians embraced the egg symbol and likened it to the tomb from which Christ rose. With the acceptance of Christianity in 988, the decorated *pysanka*

played an important role in Ukrainian rituals of the new religion, and many symbols were adapted to represent Easter and Christ's Resurrection.

The oldest known *pysanka* was excavated in Ukraine in 2013 and was found in a rainwater collection system that dates to the 15th or 16th century. This *pysanka* was written on a goose egg and was discovered largely intact.

A number of years ago, Nancy Ross introduced us to this ancient tradition using a wax-resist method of *writing* on the raw egg with melted beeswax and then dipping the egg in dye and repeating this process. The next step involves holding the egg over a candle flame and carefully wiping away the melted wax revealing the intricate designs. The last step involves varnishing the egg to preserve the design and lastly removing the content of the egg through a small hole. Most eggs have traditional Ukrainian folk designs. One of our artistic members created a Van Gogh painting and the Wizard of Oz! The eggs will be displayed throughout the Lenten and Easter seasons.

Name Tag Sunday



Remember that Sunday, March 3rd will be Name Tag Sunday. Bring an unusual nametag that you have collected over the years, or make one. *This is your one chance to create a special Transfiguration Sunday nametag*, as the festival of the Transfiguration does not always fall on the first Sunday of the month. Just make sure your name is on it, so that you and others can greet those people about whom you know much (where they sit in church, how many kids they have, how they sing hymns, etc.), but for whom you may not yet know their name.

Addressing Trauma With Anne Wallace DiGarbo, PhD

On Sunday March 31st during our 9:15 a.m. hour in the Youth Lounge the Faith and Values Class will be hosting Dr. Anne Wallace DiGarbo as a guest speaker addressing trauma. Following traumatic incidents this fall involving the youth of the greater Lancaster and Lititz community, St. Peter's leadership sought out a community counselor to come in and facilitate discussion on the topic of "when trauma happens." Middle school youth to adult learners are invited to be part of the conversation.

Dr. Anne Wallace DiGarbo is a licensed clinical psychologist and a certified addictions counselor with 36 years experience as a therapist working with individuals, couples and families. She is the president of the Alternatives to Violence Project in South Central Pennsylvania (www.avpusa.org). Her husband, who is also a therapist, and she have facilitated workshops addressing trauma in Bosnia, Israel and Palestine. In June they plan to facilitate in Gaza, focusing on trauma among youth and families. She attends Lancaster Friends Meeting.



AN UPDATE ON THE DAMAGE TO BUSOKA LUTHERAN CHURCH

The church building of our companion congregation Busoka Lutheran Church in Tanzania was extensively damaged by a windstorm in late January. The roof was completely ripped off the church and the inside was destroyed. This happened during the rainy season, which complicates matters.

The Tanzania Mission Committee (TMC) has had several communications with pastors in the Konde Diocese and from Busoka. We have a few pictures of the damage that are posted on our bulletin board. The damage is being surveyed by a specialist who will recommend the best course of action. The TMC will monitor the situation and keep you informed as to when the rebuilding process will begin and the cost.

The Busoka congregation will be worshiping in a makeshift structure until a permanent building is available. Please keep Busoka and the orphans in your thoughts and prayers. Thank you.

Pastor's Letter



"...a guilty suffering spirit is more open to grace than an apathetic or smug soul. Therefore, an age without a sense of sin, in which people are not even sorry for not being sorry for their sins, is in a serious predicament. Likewise an age with a Christianity so eager to forgive that it denies the need for forgiveness. For such an age, therefore, Lent can scarcely be too long!"

- Edna Hatlestad Hong, <u>The Downward Ascent</u> (1979)

Dear Friends:

I do not know Ms. Hong, the 20th century author of more than a dozen books. But her words from this 1979 non-fiction work ring true with me, as we will enter the season of Lent about a week from the time you are probably reading this article. "An age without a sense of sin" ... "a Christianity so eager to forgive that it denies the need for forgiveness" ... 1979 words that are possibly more relevant now forty years later than they were when Ms. Hong wrote them.

We live in a world that is terrified to identify what we see as sin ... we are terrified to even use the word most days. Our fear grows from a sense that speaking about sin, means that we are judging others unfairly. The phrase "*let him who is without sin cast the first stone*" comes to mind ... an allusion to Jesus' words in John 8:7. We have certainly had dark moments in the history of the church, where we pointed to the sin in others far more often than we acknowledged our own sin. But identifying the sin in our lives and the lives of others is not an issue of judgment. It is an issue of spiritual and relational health. We cannot maintain healthy relationships without acknowledging the sin in ourselves and others, so as to pursue repentance and reconciliation and the healthy resolutions that follow that difficult work. Suggesting that anything we do is a personal freedom that no one has a right to question, is a recipe for disaster.



Enter the season of Lent. A forty-day period in which we readily acknowledge the presence of sin in the world ... in our lives ... in the lives of those around us. A forty-day period in which we dare to question the world's illusion that we can live sinless lives. A forty-day period in which we willingly and freely entertain the conviction that we can never be the persons we desire to be. A forty-day period in which we thus turn to our savior and ask him to redeem in us what we cannot redeem ourselves, no matter how good our intentions. A forty-day period in which we also confront the world with the sin that is endemic in institutions and practices ... a sin that is entrenched in the lives of those that seem to be perfect and pure ... a sin that can be forgiven even in those that appear to be irredeemable in our eyes and in the eyes of society.

This is not a journey for the faint of heart ... not if you are serious about engaging this rhythm of sin and grace ... of repentance and forgiveness ... law and gospel ... of death and life. We will walk in St. Luke's gospel narrative for most of our Sunday travels toward Holy Week. We will walk with the prophets in our mid-week Wednesday travels toward that same holiest of weeks. We invite you to join us. Until then, I'll ...

<u> Pastor Sarah's Message</u>



Greetings friends in Christ,

In my preparation to write this month's newsletter message I sat down and opened up Thomas Keating's *Foundations for Centering Prayer and the Christian Contemplative Life*. These last few months I have been trying to pray more and be more grounded in a lifestyle of prayer. I also thought it timely to open up this book as one of the sections focuses on the church year. I was curious what Brother Thomas Keating had to say about the season of Lent.

As I roamed the pages, I found two things.

The first was a dollar. It was tucked within the pages of the book. What a sur-

prise! I have no clue how it got there, but it made me smile and chuckle a bit. It's a reminder that when we crack open a book we may be surprised by what we find!

The second thing I found is this quote from Brother Thomas Keating. *"Easter with its grace of interi*or resurrection, is the radical healing of the human condition. Lent, which prepares us for this grace, is about what needs to be healed."

The focus of being healed caught my attention as I've been fighting off whatever germs my daughter and her friends sneezed/coughed/and oozed my way last week. Yes, healing—I like some of that, please! However, Keating isn't simply referring to my sneezy, human condition, but rather the broken human condition we all share. Saint Paul wrote it well in his letter to the Romans,

"For I do not do the good I want to do, but the evil I do not want to do—this I keep on doing. Now if I do what I do not want to do, it is no longer I who do it, but it is sin living in me that does it." -Romans 7:19-20

We can really be torn between the new self (a beloved and redeemed child of God) and our old self. Thomas Keating writes that "*Repent means* ' to change the direction in which you are looking for happiness.' The call to repentance is the invitation to take stock of our emotional programs for happiness based on instinctual needs (unconscious values) and to change them."

So what if this Lenten season can be a time of searching and finding new things?

Maybe you won't find money in the next book you open, but what surprising things can you find out about yourself? Consider some of the instinctual (knee-jerk) responses you make. Are they bringing you happiness? Are they drawing you closer into relationship with God who desires to draw close to you?

How may a deepened life of prayer help you today?



From the Director of Music

Covenants

This month the people of St. Peter's present the story of Noah in song, dance, and spoken word. We've been working hard on presenting a great production, but even more importantly, we've been learning about the story of Noah and the flood and what it means for us today.

The flood story is really one of a covenant between God and humankind. God sees that creation has deviated from that which is "very good" and decides to start over with the people of

Noah's family. Having made land after the flood, Noah and his family see that God has placed a rainbow in the sky as a sign of the everlasting covenant from God: God will not destroy the earth with a flood again.

Throughout Lent, we often get stories that relate to covenants God has made. This year we hear of the promised Land in Deuteronomy, the promise of descendants and land to Abram, the promise of a water for all who thirst spiritually in Isaiah, and the eating of the Passover in the promised land in Joshua. In worship during Lent this year we are reminded that God's covenants are sure, true, and are words we can count on to quote the words of John Folkening in *Noah's RemARKable Voyage*.

And really, isn't the story of Noah just a great big baptism story? The people are sinful. The people are covered with enough water to drown sin. A new creation rises from the waters of the flood. God saves humankind. When we are baptized, our sin is taken away and God redeems us. Of course, as Pastor Sarah likes to remind us, confession is good for the soul; however, when we confess, we do so knowing that God has already forgiven us in baptism. After all, we proclaim in the words of the Nicene Creed, "we proclaim one baptism for the forgiveness of sins."

In a turn that is perhaps in the most amazing, all of these covenants are magnified when viewed in light of Christ's life and death on the cross. Every time we hear of the covenants God made with humankind we are reminded that God has worked salvation time and time again and ultimately through Jesus' victory on the cross.

As Lent begins, take some time to sing and give thanks to God for constancy, trustworthiness, and compassion demonstrated by God's love for all. Remember that "as children of the promise, a rainbow is our clue. The Lamb, the Tree, our victory. God's promises come true."

Family Camp is for all ages, all varieties of families. Elder Camp is specific to ages 55+ who would like to live in Christian community at camp.


